Household Chemical Hazards

- Hazardous household chemicals may include:
 - Oven cleaners
 - Drain cleaners
 - Wood and metal cleaners and polishes
 - Toilet cleaners
 - Tub, tile, and shower cleaners
 - Laundry bleach
 - Pool chemicals
 - Pesticides
 - Automotive chemicals
 - Paint / paint thinner
 - Herbicides
 - Batteries
 - Propane tanks



Household Chemical Hazards

- Tips for Chemical Safety:
 - Buy only as much of a chemical as you think you will use.
 - · Keep chemical products in their original containers.
 - Never mix household hazardous chemicals.
 - Clean up spills immediately.



Chemical Emergencies

- CALL 911 and POISON CONTROL: 1-800-222-1222 if ANY concern
- Symptoms of poisoning:
 - Difficulty breathing
 - Irritation of the eyes, skin, throat, or respiratory tract
 - Changes in skin color
 - Headache or blurred vision
 - Dizziness
 - Clumsiness or lack of coordination
 - Cramps or diarrhea



Household Electrical Hazards

- The most dangerous electrical hazards in the home:
 - Outdated wiring
 - Overloaded outlets and power strips
 - Outlets/electronic too close to water
 - Young children
 - Light bulbs with too much wattage





Household Electrical Hazards

- Electrical safety tips:
 - Check that you're using the correct wattage in all your fixtures and appliances.
 - Watch out for overloaded outlets to protect your home.
 - Replace or repair damaged electrical cords to keep your home safe.
 - Keep your used and unused cords tidy and secure to prevent damage.
 - Unplug all your unused appliances to reduce potential risks.
 - Keep electrical devices and outlets away from water to prevent shock.
 - Give your appliances proper space for air circulation to avoid overheating.
 - Ensure that all your exhaust fans are clean to prevent fire hazards.
 - Install GFI outlets in wet areas like bathrooms.

Cooking

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time turn off the stove.
- Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Position barbecue grills at least 10 feet away from siding and deck railings, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep a fire extinguisher available.

Electrical and Appliance Safety

- Frayed wires can cause fires. Replace all worn, old or damaged appliance cords immediately and do not run cords under rugs or furniture.
- If an appliance has a three-prong plug, use it only in a three-slot outlet. Never force it to fit into a two-slot outlet or extension cord.
- Immediately shut off, then professionally replace light switches that are hot to the touch and lights that flicker.



Portable Space Heaters

- Keep combustible objects at least three feet away from portable heating devices.
- Buy only heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Check to make the portable heater has a thermostat control mechanism and will switch off automatically if the heater falls over.
- Only use crystal clear K-1 kerosene in kerosene heaters. Never overfill it. Use the heater in a well-ventilated room.



Fireplaces and Woodstoves

- Inspect and clean woodstove pipes and chimneys annually and check monthly for damage or obstructions.
- Use a fireplace screen heavy enough to stop rolling logs and big enough to cover the entire opening of the fireplace to catch flying sparks.
- Make sure the fire is completely out before leaving the house or going to bed.



Children

- Take the mystery out of fire play by teaching children that fire is a tool, not a toy.
- Store matches and lighters out of children's reach and sight, preferably in a locked cabinet.
- Never leave children unattended near operating stoves or burning candles, even for a short time.


